LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVES



IPM in Chilly: Sticky traps

- → Chilli farming in Kadapa during the Kharif season is vital, but investments in pest and disease control chemicals have adversely affected farmers' income
- → Awareness was created through training on 'Integrated Pest Management (IPM) in Chilli with technical support from the Department of Horticulture.
- → 40 'Sticky traps' were distributed per farmer, including 20 yellow and 20 blue traps, which is sufficient for an area of 1 acre as per scientific recommendations.
- → 665 farmers have benefited from this intervention.
- → The estimated additional income from 'Sticky traps' is Rs. 25,000 per acre.
- → 108 beneficiaries received Rs. 1 lakh credit linkage each, totaling Rs. 1.08 crore, for livelihood projects such as purchasing milch animals, goat rearing, and microenterprises (provision shops, saree business, etc.).
- → Facilitated credit linkage through DCC Bank for identified women beneficiaries of Nawabpeta, Chinnakomerla, and Talamanchipatname villages.

Livelihood Loans through VDC and Watershed LH Fund

- → Inaugurated 'Sanitary Pad Making Unit' which is run by Shanthi SHG of Chinnkomerla Village.
- → This unit is established in collaboration with NABFOUNDATION under 'My Pad My Right' program with the aim of 'Supporting Livelihood of Rural Women by promoting affordable menstrual hygiene'.
- → Earning potential for SHG by sale of Sanitary pads would be Rs. 64000/- per month.
- → Production capacity of semi-automated unit is 1400 pads per day (@ 8 hours per day).

- → Livelihood loans were distributed to women beneficiaries through the Village Development Committee (VDC) Fund and the Watershed Livelihood Loan Fund.
- → A total of Rs. 12.5 lakh loan was distributed to 57 women beneficiaries.
- → The loan amount was provided for investments in milch animal management, purchase of agricultural inputs, tailor shops, and petty shops in the village.



Inauguration of Sanitary Pad Making Unit

- → Distributed Forage Multicut Sorghum (SSV 402) fodder seeds to 20 beneficiaries from 5 villages.
- → Each unit consists of 20 cents of land. DBF contributed 1 kg of seed, while beneficiaries contributed towards input costs, irrigation, and management.

Drip Irrigation

- → Facilitated the installation of drip irrigation systems in 19 acres of land for 5 farmers.
- → DBF supported in mobilizing farmers, linking them with APMIP (Govt), and connecting them with material suppliers.
- → 5 beneficiaries received drip irrigation materials worth Rs. 9.60 lakh.

- Distributed country variety chicks to 340 households (10 chicks per family, aged 45 days) to promote backyard poultry.
- → This initiative has the potential to generate an additional income of Rs. 36,000 per annum.


- → Provided sewing machines to 26 women beneficiaries to support their tailoring businesses.
- → Facilitated an orientation program for Self-Help Group (SHG) women in Nawabpata on skill training such as tailoring, embroidery, knitting, and beauty care.

This can be achieved through individual or group interventions and can function independently or converged with government programs.

A SUCCESS STORY FROM LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVE

Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) offer a swift solution for rural women seeking improved family income. DBF has successfully facilitated credit linkages through JLGs, empowering individuals to establish thriving livelihoods.

Nageshwari, a 33-year-old graduate from Chinnakomerla village, faced financial challenges relying solely on her husband's rainfed agriculture income. Unpredictable weather conditions led to losses, pushing the family into debt. To secure a consistent income, Nageshwari, driven and educated, explored opportunities with DBF.

Guided by DBF, Nageshwari joined a JLG linked with APGB bank, securing a Rs. 50,000 loan. Opting for a cost-effective approach, she initiated a saree-selling business from home. With strategic marketing efforts, her business gained popularity, achieving a monthly sale of Rs.40,000 and a net income of Rs.8,000. After a year, the venture remains successful, contributing significantly to the family's economic well-being.

Nageshwari's micro-enterprise, funded by JLG loan, has proven to be a sustainable model, with a current net worth of Rs.1 lakh and potential for future growth. Her success is reflected in improved family assets, including a two-wheeler and private school enrollment for her children
